A. Film Adaptation of English Works into English

• The Godfather (1969)

Mario Puzo's best crime novel ever, which was published in 1969, got the limelight again when the film of the same name directed by Francis Coppola was released in 1972.

Jaws (1974)

The bestseller book by Peter Benchley was filmed with the same name by the Jurassic Park inventor Steven Spielberg in 1975. You can imagine the level of thrill now!

The Shining (1977)

Stephen King's 'The Shining' got a film version of the same name by Stanley Kubrick in 1980. But the ending of the book was changed by the director.

• Nothing Lasts Forever (1979)

This book written by Roderick Thorp (Author of The Detective) got the screen when John McTiernan took its inspiration to make a phenomenal movie 'Die Hard' in 1988 with some striking changes at the end.

• Fight Club (1996)

Chuck Palahniuk's 'Fight Club' got justice with the movie having the same title directed by David Fincher (1999).

Shrek (1990)

The picture book by William Steig was good. But the movie with the same name by Adamson and Jenson was awesome (2001).

Wise Guy (1985)

Nicholas Pileggi's book having sub-title 'Life in a Mafia Family' was filmed as 'Goodfellas' (1990) in the best manner by Martin Scorsese.

• Oil (1926)

A brilliant social satire by Pulitzer prize winner Upton Sinclair got its film version in 2007 named as 'There Will Be Blood', the Oscar-nominated epic.

• L. A. Confidential (1990)

James Ellroy's book also was filmed by Curtis Hanson in 1997 having the same name.

Queen Bees and Wannabes (2002)

This book by Rosalind Wiseman was filmed in the best way with the title 'Mean Girls' in 2004 directed by Mark Waters.

Madame Doubtfire (1987)

Known as 'Alias Madame Doubtfire' in the United States is a 1987 novel written by Anne Fine for teenage and young adult audiences. The movie with the same name in 1993 by Robin Williams was a hands-down winner with proper comic timing.

• Forest Gump (1986)

Winston Groom's book, when transformed into a film with the same title in 1994, got the Oscar. With several changes, the movie is best by all measures.

• The Bladerunner (1974)

This 1974 science fiction novel by Alan E. Nourse got the film version with the same name in 1982. It is very relevant to the novel.

Psycho (1959)

This 1959 thriller novel by American writer Robert Bloch saw a pivotal plot change in Alfred Hitchcock's adaptation in 1960.

• The Exorcist (1971)

This book with supernatural explanations and horror got the film version in 1973. It was scripted and produced by its author William Blatty. It was directed by William Friedkin. The interesting fact is that there is an entire book written

on this movie being "the scariest film ever made" by renowned critic Mark Kermode.

• The Silence of the Lamps (1988)

Thomas Harris wrote this chilling book and it was equally picturized with Sir Anthony Hopkins in 1991.

• Jurassic Park (1990)

This book written by Michael Crichton got the movie version directed by Spielberg in 1993 and got the fantabulous series. Rest is the history!

• Sense and Sensibility (1811)

The complicated story by Jane Austen was made into a film by And Lee. The film was simple and sober in all way of 1995.

• The Body (1982)

Stephen King, who has written this novella has declared the adaption 'Stand By Me' to be the closest-to-his-books film so far which was directed by Rob Reiner. This was released in 1986.
